What's New at Virginia LISC?

- Upon the departure of Orlando Artze from LISC to accept a position with Community Housing Partners here in Richmond, Greta Harris was promoted to the position of Program Vice President, with the responsibility for LISC offices in Washington, DC, Virginia, Winston-Salem, NC, and Jacksonville, FL, Tampa, FL, and South Florida. An executive search is under way for her replacement.
- Other new faces at Virginia LISC include GIS and Research Analyst Frances Stanley, who brings to LISC ten years of experience as Senior Research Analyst at the Federal Reserve Bank of Richmond; Barbara DuVal, Office Manager; and Erin Kelley, Loan Development Officer, formerly with National LISC for four years.
- Several new donors have pledged support to Virginia LISC since the kick-off event in October of last year. Major new donors include the Cameron Foundation, whose generous donation will bring LISC services to Petersburg; the Mary Morton Parsons Foundation; and a new green development grant from Home Depot, which will supply grant money to two LISC partners: Virginia Supportive Housing and Petersburg Urban Ministries (PUM).
